### Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2025. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### **Objectives and aims**

The charity's mission statement is:

"To work with others to help build a resilient, inclusive, enterprising community capable of dealing with ongoing change."

The company's Memorandum and Articles of Association states that:

"The company has been formed to benefit the community of Huntly and surrounding district as defined by the postcode units within postcode sector AB54 {the "Community"). The Company has the aim to build a resilient, inclusive, enterprising Community capable of dealing with ongoing change."

The Company has the following objectives:

- o To advance development of the Community by maintaining, improving and regenerating its physical, economic, social and cultural infrastructure, and assisting people who are at a disadvantage because of their social and economic circumstances;
- o To advance the education of people and organisations so that they can play a leading, proactive role in the sustainable development of the Community;
- o To advance the arts, heritage and culture of the Community to the benefit of both locals and visitors;
- o To advance public participation in sport (meaning sport which involves physical skill and exertion);
- o To advance environmental protection or improvement;
- o To provide recreational facilities and organise recreational activities within the Community, with the object of improving the conditions of life for all; and
- o To promote, establish, operate and/or support other similar activities and projects of a charitable nature within the Community for its benefit.

But such that the Company shall do so following the principles of sustainable development and in a way that respects and enhances the Community's local culture, social traditions and built heritage, as well as the local and global natural environment."

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

Significant activities

During the 2024/25 financial year, HDT has carried out the following activities under the respective headings.

# To advance development of the Community by maintaining, improving and regenerating its physical, economic, social and cultural infrastructure, and assisting people who are at a disadvantage because of their social and economic circumstances.

o In a major milestone both for the Trust and our community in 2024-25 we were able to open the doors to the public on our flagship project, "Number 30, The Square". The redevelopment of the former Cruickshank's department store into a multi-use anchor community facility and attraction has been a five-year project undertaken in very challenging circumstances (e.g. Covid, construction cost increases). On 12th September 2024, the cinema opened its doors for the first time. A month later, on 10th October, the café opened. Since then, these two elements have operated five days/week. This has provided employment for 16 people on a full or part-time basis, volunteering opportunities for 20 people and work experience for three young people. Behind the scenes, work has continued on preparing other parts of the building for opening. On completion, besides the café and cinema the building will include co-working space, retail, gallery and flexible learning space.

o We have continued managing the tenancy of Orbs Community Bookshop at 10½ the Square.

o In the reporting period, we recruited a new manager, Jo Macmillan, for our Huntly Travel Hub based at 11 Deveron Street. Shortly afterwards, she was seconded across to Number 30 to help with getting the building open and having demonstrated her skills in operating the multi-faceted space she was appointed manager at Number 30 in November 2024. Simultaneously, we had been approached by Cash Access UK who had been charged with opening a temporary banking hub in the town within 3 months of the granting of a "community request" for such a facility. Cash Access UK identified the Travel Hub as an ideal base and with the kind permission of our funders, we were able to offer them the space on a temporary basis. Our Travel Hub activities then moved next door to the vacant retail space within Number 30, from which we have made available our e-bikes and information about all kinds of low-cost, convenient transport and walking options. When the banking hub finds its permanent home, we will move the Travel Hub back to its base. The Huntly Community Minibus continues to be in strong demand and has been especially useful in transporting pupils of The Gordon Schools to and from Greenmyres for activities made possible through the Tackling Poverty and Inequalities (TP&I) Fund of Aberdeenshire Council.

o We continued to work with Deveron Projects, Gordon Rural Action and Networks of Wellbeing and the wider Huntly Town Team, on various projects.

## To advance the education of people and organisations so that they can play a leading, proactive role in the sustainable development of the Community.

o We have continued liaison with local schools and further/higher education institutes and training bodies regarding their involvement in the development of Greenmyres and the property at Number 30. This included liaison with staff and pupils at both Gordon Primary School and The Gordon Schools on initiatives related to Number 30. The Head Teacher of The Gordon Schools is an active member of the Number 30 operations group.

#### To advance the arts, heritage and culture of the Community to the benefit of both locals and visitors

o The opening of the multi-events space (cinema/theatre) space and gallery in Number 30 has been a significant breakthrough for advancing arts, heritage and culture in and for our community. The first public event in Number 30 was the Illustration Festival held in the gallery space by Helen Bate, a volunteer with Orbs Community Bookshop, to mark the 200th anniversary of the birth of local author George Macdonald. The festival proved very popular with all ages, including schoolchildren, and more events held in the building, both community and corporate, have been very successful and well attended so far. The cinema showings have been the first in Huntly since 1970 and have proved very popular. Towards the end of the reporting period, we held our first live theatre production, which sold out and has whetted the appetite for more. Plans are afoot for further exhibitions, plus regular and specialist film screenings and live theatre performances.

- o In October, Number 30 hosted a day-long workshop and evening concert by renowned local singer Iona Fyfe. At Christmas, it hosted the Gordon Schools' Christmas concert and pupils' art exhibition.
- o We have maintained custody of the archives of our local newspaper, the Huntly Express, while we investigate how to conserve and digitise the 160-year-old archives and make them accessible worldwide. The archives are now stored in Number 30 and accessible on request.

#### To advance public participation in sport (meaning sport which involves physical skill and exertion

o The maps and flyers we have produced as part of our Huntly Travel Hub project have continued to prove popular with locals and visitors alike, allowing them to explore routes around the area on foot or by bike. These are available online (https://www.huntlydt.org/what-we-do/huntly-travel-hub/walking-and-cycling-routes), our Huntly Travel Hub premises, Orbs Community Bookshop and The Bikery.

- o Our Huntly Travel Hub e-bikes continued to provide valuable and popular physical activity.
- o Throughout the summer and autumn we ran various sporting sessions at our Greenmyres site, making use of the newly created cycle pump track and pond. On the former we were able to offer skills development and confidence building sessions and on the latter, stand-up paddleboarding, canoeing and kayaking sessions. These were offered to pupils of the Gordon Schools through the TP&I fund, and for the wider public as part of holiday camps and private bookings. Uniformed groups also took part.
- o With the help of funding secured from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF), North East Adventure Tourism (NEAT), Canoe Foundation and our own resources, we also completed expansion of the Greenmyres pond to enable it to host more and bigger groups and different types of sporting events, e.g. triathlon and canoe polo.

#### To advance environmental protection or improvement

- o Although slightly disrupted in the reporting period because of some personnel and premises changes, our Travel Hub continues to provide community access to electric bikes and shared vehicles. These are excellent ways to encourage low carbon travel, and we are delighted that usage continues to increase, especially of the fully electric vehicle at the Market Muir.
- o As part of the pond expansion project at Greenmyres, we have taken advice from an ecologist to ensure that construction works are both undertaken in an environmentally sensitive way, and create opportunities for wildlife to flourish even better on site by e.g. incorporating swales into the design of the pond embankment. The wildlife scrapes at the lower end of the site have proved popular for pond-dipping for local schools.
- o Our buildings at Number 30, Greenmyres and Huntly Travel Hub all provide examples for the community of how different techniques can be applied to reduce negative environmental impacts and create new opportunities for wildlife. These include ground source heat pump and super-insulation in the Greenmyres Ecobothy, solar panels, insulation and a VRF air source heating and cooling system at Number 30, and the sedum roof at 11 Deveron Street.
- oThrough our trading subsidiary, Greenmyres Renewable Energy (GRE), we have continued to deliver green electricity from our wind turbine to the grid.
- o We continued to work in partnership with the operators of the Cairnborrow and Wheedlemont wind turbines.
- o We have continued investigating the feasibility of generating increased renewable energy at Gartly Moor/Greenmyres through additional wind turbines and a solar meadow. Further work is needed to make this happen, with community consultation being the key next step.

## To provide recreational facilities and organise recreational activities within the Community, with the object of improving the conditions of life for all.

- o The cinema/theatre, gallery and café at Number 30 are significant additional social and recreational activities for all in our community. In addition to the film screenings and theatre performance already mentioned, Number 30 also regularly hosts classes in pilates, and yoga classes and parent and toddler stay and play sessions. These have provided exceedingly popular from a standing start when the building first opened its doors in September 2024.
- o Similarly, the cycle pump track, pond and dog park at Greenmyres have proved extremely popular and we are hopeful that the expanded pond, once refilled, will be welcomed too. Looking further ahead, we aim to establish Greenmyres as an even better family-friendly outdoor adventure facility. This could involve mountain bike trails, accommodation and café, all of which dovetails with our ongoing discussions with Forestry and Land Scotland re potential community asset transfer of part of Gartly Moor to allow us to deliver additional opportunities and benefits from Greenmyres.

To promote, establish, operate and/or support other similar activities and projects of a charitable nature within the Community for its benefit.

- o We continued to use our social media channels to update the community on what we as HOT are doing and improve wider Trust communication.
- o We participated actively in the Huntly Town Team.
- o We continued to hold in trust funds received from Engie's Cairnborrow Wind Farm for the Cairnie Glass Community Trust and transfer 25% of the donations received from Cnoc Cailliche's Wheedlemont Wind Turbine to Rhynie Charitable Trust. Similarly, we continue to hold in trust funds received from the community for re-building of the Battlehill hut which was destroyed by fire in May 2020.

o With financial assistance from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF), Opportunity North East Adventure Tourism (NEAT) initiative, and the Canoe Foundation we completed works to extend the pond, build a new perimeter path and install two cabins for storage and pondside briefings in March 2025. This will improve access to watersports for all in the community and wider North East and provide greater opportunities for a larger number of people. With the help of our contractors and design team, all was achieved to budget and timescale, despite the challenging schedule.

- o We enjoyed the first full year of our first Greenmyres Business and Operations Manager, Mike Gifford, a role cofunded by the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF).
- o We successfully hosted a growing number and range of users at the site, including local uniformed groups, schools, businesses and arts groups, as well as local runners, walkers and cyclists. A key success for us was the securing of support through the Tackling Poverty and Inequalities (TP&I) Fund of Aberdeenshire Council, which allowed us to deliver over 900 pupil sessions for the Gordon Schools (TGS) at Greenmyres and off-site. Some of these were with school non-attenders with whom we have successfully re-engaged.

#### **Huntly Travel Hub**

- o With the help of the Smarter Choices Smarter Places fund we recruited a new manager, Jo Macmillan, for the Huntly Travel Hub (HTH) in June 2024. However, shortly after, due to her experience in running a multi-faceted venue, including café, we seconded her next door to Number 30 to help get that building open. Although the secondment was initially for a short period, this switch proved very successful, and we confirmed Jo as the Number 30 manager on a permanent basis in November 2024. Other members of the HDT team then took on responsibility for keeping the Travel Hub running.
- o In October 2024, we temporarily re-located the operations base of the Travel Hub 11 Deveron Street to the vacant retail space in Number 30. This facilitated use of 11 Deveron Street as a temporary banking hub for Huntly, while a permanent location was identified. The banking hub organisers approached us as the fully refurbished and accessible 11 Deveron Street premises were ideal for them. Our funders kindly gave permission, so we moved delivery of our Travel Hub project to the retail space in Number 30. We understand that the banking hub is close to finding a permanent location for operations at which point we will transfer the Travel Hub back to 11 Deveron Street.
- o During all of these changes we have continued operations of the Co-wheels shared cars, e-bike fleet and community minibus, and our maintenance agreement with the Bikery of Gordon Rural Action, ensuring our e-bikes remain well-maintained and thereby assisting another local charity.
- o We have been successful in securing further support for the HTH in 2025/26 from the NESTRANS People and Places Programme. NESTRANS held their celebration of achievements of their 2024/25 programme in Number 30 in March 2025.

#### **Town Centre Development**

- o As explained above, the major achievement of the reporting period both for HDT as an organisation and for our community was the opening of Number 30, The Square, some five years after its acquisition. The subsequent redevelopment of the former department store was long awaited and when the opening finally happened the community response was very positive indeed. With the main refurbishment work complete and the café and cinema operational, we are now focusing on opening the remaining elements of the building.
- o With the benefit of an experienced Business and Operations Manager and a strong staff team, the facility is making good growth. The Business managers post is supported with funds through UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF). The entire staff team at Number 30 is now 18 strong.
- o We continued operating the former Royal Bank of Scotland building on The Square as landlord to Orbs Community Bookshop.

#### **Heritage Development**

o We moved the archives of our local newspaper, the Huntly Express, from the Brander Building to Number 30, in order to be able to better maintain and manage access to them.

#### Sport, Health and Wellbeing Development

- o Our Aberdeenshire Council Tackling Poverty and Inequalities funded work and summer/October holiday camps at Greenmyres contributed significantly to the development of Sport, Health and Wellbeing in our community.
- o We continued to hold and administer the AB54 Health and Wellbeing Fund on behalf of the AB54 Health and Wellbeing Group.

#### **Energising Our Community**

- o Our key asset, the community wind turbine at Greenmyres operated by our wholly owned trading subsidiary Greenmyres Renewable Energy Ltd (GRE) performed well in 2024-25, largely due to the higher energy prices we all face. GRE provided several significant donations to HDT, allowing us to meet our borrowing commitments, invest in match-funding projects and meet core organisational costs. GRE also secured Power Purchase Agreements at a reasonable, if slightly lower level, for the next financial year. We also successfully refinanced the main commercial loan for the wind turbine with Virgin Money.
- o The reporting period also saw the Trust receive further community benefit payments from the two other wind energy projects, Cairnborrow and Wheedlemont, in which the Trust has negotiated an enhanced stake on behalf of the community. The Trust ring-fences and transfers 25% of the income it receives from these developments to organisations representing the civil parishes closest to the developments, Cairnie Glass Community Trust and Rhynie Charitable Trust.
- o We continued exploration of a potential solar PV array and additional wind turbines at Greenmyres/Gartly Moor, a project which has the potential to deliver significant environmental and economic benefits to our community. For this to happen, we must now secure land rights over the area in question at Gartly Moor. This will offer wider education, recreation and economic opportunities for the community.
- o We continued discussions with Vattenfall about the potential opportunity for community shared ownership at their proposed Clashindarroch II development.

#### Diverse

- o We continued our work to better promote what the Trust is doing. This principally involves more regular and proactive posting on social media, as well as managing our website.
- o We increased our membership by 18 (3.1%) to 594.
- o Opening of Number 30 and in particular choosing to operate the café ourselves has seen our employee numbers rise from 6 in September 2024 to 21 today (ca 12.5 FTE).

## Financial review Financial position

Net resources for the year show a surplus of £453,478 (2024, deficit of £3,480,177) which is an increase on last year's financial performance. This is mainly due to a valuation carried out in the previous year of the properties held resulting in an impairment charge of approximately £4m.

The charity received restricted funds of £693,948 (2024, £833,712) during the year. The application of these amounts is at the discretion of the Trustees under the terms of the funder. The restricted fund income of the charity derives from funding received from local authorities, clubs, charities, other funders and individuals. The main element of the restricted fund income has come from Scottish Government grants towards the redevelopment of Number 30 The Square, Huntly and the redevelopment of Greenmyres Pond.

All other funds of the charity are unrestricted. The unrestricted fund income of the charity derives from donations, rentals, and fees charged by the charity in respect of the services it provides and merchandise it sells. Our total unrestricted funds received was £818,362 (2024, £595,813), with the bulk of the increase arising from the income from the Cafe and Cinema.

At £1,058,832 our expenditure was lower than in 2024 (£4,731,725), due to the £4,085,780 impairment charge. After this is accounted for, the biggest increase in expenditure was relating to Cafe and Cinema costs, including additional Wages.

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three- and six-months' expenditure. The Trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. While the level of unrestricted reserves has increased over the year to £1,489,080 compared to 2024 (£894,115), maintaining it sustainably at the desired level has not yet been achieved and the Trustees will continue to work to increase the funds to such a level in the medium term. It is important to note that that our level of unrestricted funds does not reflect HDT's liquid cash position. Most of these funds are tied up in assets that we would have to sell in order for them to be realised.

#### **Future plans**

Our plans for 2025/26 aim to build upon the work of the last 12 months, and previous periods.

#### **Growing Greenmyres**

- o With financial support from NESTRANS, delivery of walking and cycling sessions for local schools, community groups and individuals.
- o Once the pond refills and the suspended sediment clears, begin delivery of the first watersports activities on the new water body. This will be for a range of users, including pupils of The Gordon Schools through the Aberdeenshire Council Tackling Poverty and Inequalities programme, uniformed groups, private individuals and holiday camp groups.
- o Marketing the offer at Greenmyres to ensure the local community and wider North-East are aware of the site and how they can benefit from what it offers.
- o Continuing plans for the next phase of site development works, including both improved site infrastructure and more (tree)planting and other biodiversity improvements.
- o Continuing engagement with all potential users of the Ecobothy and the wider site to promote it as a venue for all.

#### **Huntly Travel Hub**

- o Continue to build the operations of the Huntly Travel Hub (HTH) so that more people are aware of the HTH and how they can benefit from what it offers.
- o Further operate, promote and grow the usage of the car club, minibus and e-bike rental scheme.
- o Continue to promote cycling and walking opportunities locally, especially through liaison with The Bikery and Aberdeenshire Council, and by promoting our maps showcasing local routes.
- o Progress the next stages of the Mini-Holland project depending on Aberdeenshire Council feedback to the community engagement and initial proposals.
- o Support Aberdeenshire Council's plans for installation of community bike storage in the town.

#### **Town Centre Development**

- o Continue to operate the café and cinema successfully, adapting the offer as needed and securing new events and initiatives to keep the offering fresh.
- o Fully open and market the availability of all remaining areas of Number 30 The Square. This includes the co-working centre, gallery, retail space, and learning and training zone.
- o Develop and grow community benefit activities and events in Number 30.
- o Manage the growth and development of Number 30 financially and practically.
- o Continue to manage as landlords the former RBS building at 10½ The Square

### **Heritage Development**

- o Identify how best to progress the Huntly Express Archives Project.
- o Continue to support efforts to re-establish a heritage/museum group.

#### Sport, Health and Wellbeing Development

- o Continue work with others to deliver the Learning and Leisure Campus project, as capacity allows.
- o Deliver the outdoor adventure activities at Greenmyres to facilitate improved access to watersports and cycling opportunities for all.

o Continue to administer the AB54 Health and Wellbeing Fund

#### **Energising Our Community**

- o Monitor performance of the Greenmyres wind turbine through our trading subsidiary, GRE and liaise with the operators of the Cairnborrow and Wheedlemont wind projects and the communities of Glass, Cairnie, Rhynie and Lumsden on their community benefit funds.
- o Continue explorations into the opportunity to generate further renewable energy at Greenmyres/Gartly Moor, using solar PV and additional wind turbines. This will include continuing discussions with Forestry and Land Scotland repotential community asset transfer of part of Gartly Moor.
- o Identify and pursue other appropriate renewable energy opportunities, e.g. community shared ownership at Clashindarroch II.
- o Use the income from GRE and the Cairnborrow and Wheedlemont wind projects to invest in the Trust and our projects and assist the communities of Glass, Cairnie, Rhynie and Lumsden in theirs.

#### Diverse

- o Continue participation in the Huntly Town Team and support delivery of some of the outcomes of the (refreshed) Room to Thrive community consultation.
- o Continue to improve our communication.
- o Recruit new Trustees to our board, add to our staff team, and increase our membership levels.
- o Improve our financial reporting through Xero, our accounting system.
- o Produce a new HDT strategy and business plan.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### **Governing document**

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006, and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. HM Revenue & Customs have granted charitable status to the company under Section 505 of the Income and Corporation Taxes Act 1988. HM Revenue & Customs recognise the company as a charity for tax purposes in line with Paragraph 1 of Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010. The charity is also recognised as a registered charity by the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator. In accordance with the Memorandum of Association, every member is liable to contribute the sum of £1 in the event of the charity being wound up.

### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association, Huntly Development Trust (HDT) can accommodate up to 12 Trustees with a minimum of three. A maximum of 10 must be Ordinary Members (living in the AB54 postcode sector). Up to 5 can be Associate Directors (living outwith the AB54 postcode sector). Trustees who are Ordinary Members must always form the majority. Trustees are either elected annually by the members of the charitable company attending the Annual General Meeting (AGM) or co-opted by the Trustees based on their skills and /or experience. Trustees may serve for a period of five years, unless specifically agreed otherwise by HDT members. The chair of the trustees is agreed amongst the Trustees. All members are circulated prior to the AGM advising them of the retiring trustees and whether they are seeking re-election.

#### FUNDS HELD AS CUSTODIAN FOR OTHERS

The charity acted as an agent on behalf of AB54 Health and Wellbeing during the year. The charity took in income of £119 (2024, £114) and paid out £NIL (2024, £456) during the year on behalf of AB54 Health and Wellbeing. The balance held at the year end amounted to £8,581 (2024, £8,462) which is being held in a separate bank account by the charity.

The charity acted as an agent on behalf of Cairnie Glass Community Trust during the year. The charity acted as an agent on behalf of Rhynie Charitable Trust during the year. The charity took in income of £12,188 (2024, £8,063) and paid out £8,063 (2024, £2,500) during the year on behalf of Battlehill. The balance held at the year end amounted to £12,188 (2024, £8,063).

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

#### 1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in Scotland, and a registered charity in Scotland. The charity's registered number and principal address can be found in the Reference and Administration Details section.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Basis of preparing the financial statements**

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The presentation currency of the financial statements is the Pound Sterling  $(\pounds)$ .

#### Preparation of consolidated financial statements

These financial statements consolidate the accounts of Huntly Development Trust Limited and its wholly owned subsidiary Greenmyres Renewable Energy Ltd.

The subsidiary undertaking has been included in the group accounts using the acquisition method of accounting. Accordingly, the group statement of financial activities and the group statement of financial position include the results of the subsidiary undertaking.

Intercompany items have been eliminated in the consolidated financial statements.

The charity has taken advantage of the exemptions under FRS 102 in relation to not disclosing related party transactions with wholly owned subsidiaries. The charity has taken advantage of the s408 exemption not to file a separate income and expenditure account.

### **Going Concern**

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the group and the parent charitable company have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus, the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

### Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

### Useful economic life of tangible assets

The annual depreciation charge for the tangible assets is sensitive to changes in the estimated useful economic life and residual values of the assets. The useful economic life and residual value is re-assessed annually. It is amended when necessary to reflect current estimates, based on technological advancement, future investments, economic utilisation and the physical condition of the assets. See note 2 for the depreciation accounting policy for the useful economic life of the assets and note 12 for the carrying amount of the assets.

#### Income

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

o income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.

o legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.

o income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.

o income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

o income received as an agent is held within a separate bank account by the charity and such income is not included within the statement of financial activities of the charity. Amounts are paid out of these funds as and when requested by the principal for each fund.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - 5% on cost and not provided

Improvements to property - 20% on cost, 10% on cost and not provided

Fixtures and fittings - 20% on cost

Motor vehicles - 25% on reducing balance Office equipment - 20% on reducing balance

Wind Turbine & Associated - 4% on cost

Infrastructure

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

No depreciation has been charged on most of the properties or improvements as some of the buildings are not currently in use. The directors are of the opinion that, based on current market conditions, the buildings that are currently in use would not have depreciated in value and would not be worth less than valuation. The newly acquired log cabins will be depreciated at 5% per annum, based on an expected life of 20 years.

#### Investments

Fixed asset investments are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any valuation.

#### Stocks

Stocks are measured at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost includes all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the stock to its present location and condition.

#### **Taxation**

The parent charitable company is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date. For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

#### **Financial instruments**

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

For all equity instruments regardless of significance, and other financial assets that are individually significant, these are assessed individually for impairment. Other financial assets are either assessed individually or grouped on the basis of similar credit risk characteristics.

#### **Government Grants**

Government grants are recognised at the fair value of the asset received or receivable. Grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the charity will comply with the conditions attaching to them and the grants will be received.

Where the grant does not impose specified future performance-related conditions on the recipient, it is recognised in income when the grant proceeds are received or receivable. Where the grant does impose specified future performance-related conditions on the recipient, it is recognised in income only when the performance-related conditions have been met. Where grants received are prior to satisfying the revenue recognition criteria, they are recognised as a liability.

### 22. NON-DOMESTIC RATES RELIEF

During the year, as a registered charity HDT received a mix of mandatory and discretionary rates relief on its premises in accordance with local council guidelines. This resulted in total savings of £25,706 in business rates. The Trustees are grateful to Aberdeenshire Council for this support, which enables more funds to be directed to charitable activities.
